

## **Reciprocal Clubs**

The Chelmsford Club has reciprocal arrangements with other private members clubs both in the United Kingdom and abroad. Each arrangement is different and it is advisable to contact the club you are intending to visit prior to going.

### **The National Liberal Club**

Situated on the Thames, close to the Houses of Parliament, the National Liberal Club is described as "London's most inclusive club".

### **The Bangkok Club**

The Bangkok Club, established in August 1995, is the largest executive city club in Thailand, both in actual floor space and in its membership.

### **The British Club**

The British Club Bangkok is a private members' Club in the Central Business District of downtown Bangkok, Thailand. We were founded in 1903 as a British businessmen's and diplomats' club but have developed over the past century to be the social, sports & cultural centre for the English-speaking community in Bangkok.

### **The Kent and Canterbury Club**

The Kent and Canterbury Club was formed from an amalgamation of the East Kent Club inaugurated in 1873 and the Canterbury Club which was founded in 1875. When the premises of the Canterbury Club were destroyed by enemy bombing in 1942, the two clubs joined to form the present Kent & Canterbury Club.

### **The Winchester House Club**

The Winchester House Club was built in the early part of the 17th Century and still benefits from one of the most enviable scenic river views in London.

### **The City University Club**

The City University Club (CUC) is a lunch club in the heart of the financial area of London.

### **The Chelmsford Club Delhi**

The Chelmsford Club Delhi was founded in 1917-18. The Chelmsford Club was raised on 27th July, 1928 on a Lease Deed signed between the Secretary of State for India and Chelmsford Club Limited.

### **The Ipswich and Suffolk Club**

The club has provided a haven for its members since the 19th Century and The Ipswich & Suffolk Club has long been referred to as one of Suffolk's best-kept secrets.
